



LLM Degree Structure


Basic requirements - Completion of 180 credits

60 credit dissertation



Why study Intellectual Property law?


- Global use of intellectual property has been on the rise in the last decade and it is now an important concern in both developed and developing economies.
- Intellectual Property protection has increasingly been associated with the aims of promoting economic growth, innovation, and creativity.



Why study Intellectual Property law? Continued

The ever-increasing role and impact of Intellectual Property law and policy makes specialised knowledge of this subject a valuable asset for those:

- intending to enter legal practice and specialise in intellectual property law;
- seeking to work in areas such as the creative industries, cultural industries, manufacturing industries, pharmaceuticals, life sciences, computing, information and communication technologies, artificial intelligence etc. with a focus on intellectual property;
- intending to take up a policymaking role in relation to knowledge-intensive sectors;
- looking to undertake further postgraduate study in the area of intellectual property law or pursue a research or academic career.

You will have the option to take between 0 and 20 credits of the following courses from different subject areas offered by the Law School, depending on availability and with the express permission of the programme director.*




Dissertation (60 credits)

- Approved topic in the field of IP Law
- 10,000 words
- Written between April-August
- Structured supervision to support your independent scholarly research
- An excellent foundation for doctoral research and a good as a focal point on your CV more generally



How you will learn

- Normally weekly two-hour interactive seminars per semester for each subject
- Active participation in discussions and advance reading expected
- Classes may also involve lectures, class debates, individual presentations, or group exercises for example.
- No exams
- Courses use a range of take-home assessments (e.g. essays, reports) or in-class work (oral presentations, class participation).




Wider experience in IP
